

Dundas Range Flora List from a HFNC excursion on 21 Aug. 1993

The walk followed no tracks and commenced at the NW corner, about 300 m south of the Masons Rd/Lyons Rd intersection near the Shooting Range, and proceeded about 500 m to gain the top of the northernmost part of the range. From there it continued south along the spine to the Fire Tower on Mt Dundas, some 7 km distant, and thence down the slope through the bush to the western boundary track.

Acacia aculeatissima – Thin-leaf Wattle (on open stringybark saddle only)
Acacia gunnii – Ploughshare Wattle
Acacia longifolia – Sallow Wattle (a few only)
Acacia mearnsii – Black Wattle (also seen near cliffs)
Acacia melanoxylon – Blackwood (a few in gullies only)
Acacia mucronata – Narrow-leaf wattle (many in an outwash area)
Acacia myrtifolia – Myrtle Wattle
Acacia paradoxa – Hedge Wattle
Acacia verticillata – Prickly Moses (not common)
Acaena anserinifolium – Sheep's Burr
Adiantum aethiopicum – Common Maidenhair
Allocasuarina verticillata – Drooping She-oak (a few on one ridge top)
Arthropodium fimbriatus – Vanilla Lily (one specimen)
Asplenium flabellifolium – Neckless Fern (a few in crevices)
Astroloma humifusum – Cranberry Heath (also in saddles)
Banksia marginata – Silver Banksia (a few flowering on top of peak nearest Mt Dundas)
Brachyloma ciliatum – Fringed Brachyloma (also common further on)
Brachyloma daphnoides – Daphne Heath
Brunonia australis – Blue Pincushion (prolific in places)
Burchardia umbellata – Milk Maids
Bursaria spinosa – Sweet Bursaria (common near and on cliffs)
Callitris rhomboidea – Oyster Bay Pine (common)
Calytrix tetragona – Fringe-myrtle (a few only; not in flower)
Carpobrotus modestus – Inland Pigface (a few on cliffs)
Chaemiscilla corymbosa – Blue Stars (not in flower)
Cheilanthes austrotenuifolia – Rock Fern
Conospermum mitchelli – Smokebush (not common)
Corea reflexa – Common Correa
Correa aemula – Hairy correa (commonplace amongst rocks and on cliffs)
Davesia brevifolia – Leafless Bitter-pea (not in flower)
Dianella longifolia – Pale Flax-lily
Dianella revoluta – Black-anther Flax-lily (also common on cliffs)
Dillwynia hispida – Red Parrot-pea (not in flower; uncommon)
Dillwynia glaberrima – Smooth Parrot-pea (not in flower; uncommon)
Dodoneaea cuneata – Wedge-leaf Hop-bush (cliffs)
Drosera auriculata – Tall Sundew
Epacris impressa – Common Heath
Eucalyptus aromaphloia – Scent-bark (on and around cliffs)
Eucalyptus baxteri – Brown Stringybark
Eucalyptus camaldulensis – River Red Gum (flats)
Eucalyptus ovata – Swamp Gum (outwash slope)
Eucalyptus viminalis – Manna Gum (possibly together with Scent-bark on cliffs)
Exocarpos cupressiformis – Cherry Ballart
Geranium solanderi – Austral Cranes-bill
Grevillea aquifolium – Variable Prickly Grevillea (only on east side of cliff)
Hakea rostrata – Beaked Hakea (not common)
Helichrysum bracteatum – Golden Everlasting (big head, narrow leaves – many near cliff)

Helichrysum obcordatum – Grey Everlasting
Hibertia riparia – Erect Guinea-flower
 # *Hovea heterophylla* – Common Hovea
Indigophora australis – Australian Indigo (prolific in one place)
Isopogon ceratophyllus – Horny Cone-bush
Ixodia achillioides – Ixodia (some in flower)
Juncus pallidus – Pale Rush
Juncus pauciflora – Loose Flower-rush
Kennedia prostrata – Running Postman (a single plant)
Leptospermum juniperinum – Prickly Tea-tree (uncommon, on lower wetter area)
Leptospermum myrsinoides – Heath Tea-tree (uncommon)
Leptospermum scoparium – Manuka
Leucopogon ericoides – Pink Beard-heath (common)
Leucopogon virgatus – Common Beard-heath (common)
Lomandra filiformis – Wattle Mat-rush
 # *Micromyrtus ciliatum* – Heath-myrtle (a few bushes)
Olearia ramulosa – Twiggy Daisy-bush (on rocks, many heavily browsed)
Pelagonium australe – Austral Pelagonium
Pelagonium rodneyanum – Magenta Stork's-bill (flowering)
 # *Platylobium obtusangulum* – Common Flat-pea
Pteridium esculentum – Austral Bracken (common throughout)
Pterostylis nana – Dwarf Greenhood (in moss on cliff top)
Ptilotus macrocephalus – Featherheads (one specimen)
Pultenea scabra – Rough Bush-pea (around cliffs only)
Pultenea humilis – Common Rice-flower (not in flower; uncommon)
Pyrorchis nigricans – Red Beaks Orchid (leaves only).
Senecio pinnatifolius – Variable Groundsel
Senecio odoratus – Scented Groundsel (blue-leaved plant – numerous)
 # *Senecio squarrosus* – Leafy Fireweed
Spyridium parvifolium – Australian Dusty Miller (a few large bushes)
 # *Spyridium vexilliferum* – Winged Spyridium
Stellaria pungens – Prickly Starwort
Stenantha conostephioides – Flame Heath (common)
Stylidium perpusillum – Trigger Plant (top of cliffs)
Stypandra glauca – Nodding Blue-lily (very common amongst rocks)
Styphelia adscendens – Golden Heath (quite common)
Tetratheca ciliata – Pink-bells (only a few plants here and on walk out)
Wurmbia dioica – Early Nancy
Xanthorrhoea minor – Small Grass-tree (uncommon)
